Evacuee story- Michael Hume

(As Newsletter Editor I was delighted to receive an e mail from Michael Hume with the following article The True Horrors of War which is published in The Evacuee – the Magazine of the British Evacuees Association- May/June 2019. Michael, his brother Geoffrey and his sister Mary were all evacuated here in Ugborough towards the end of the war, when the bombing of London was increasingly heavy. I have had further e mail conversations with Michael and he is very happy for his article and his subsequent additional memories to be reproduced in our Parish Newsletter. I hope that it may stir a few memories and also remind us all of what war is really like. Michael also forwarded some photos of himself and his brother, and the house he was evacuated to which is reproduced on the back page).

I was born on 6th June 1939 and my family lived in Plumstead, S.E. London. I have vivid memories of the war, and one of my earliest memories is of lying in the bedroom in our terraced house at number 140 Eglington Road and seeing the beams of the searchlights in the sky at night, and hearing the wailing of the sirens, which even today unsettle me. I have memories of my brother and me wandering around the local streets collecting the much prized shrapnel. I also remember coming back home from Eglington Primary School nearby to find that all the windows of our house had been shattered by an explosion, with strands of glass lying everywhere.

I believe I was evacuated at the age of 5 along with my elder sister, Mary aged 12 and my brother who was 2 years older than I was, sometime in July 1944. I can't be sure of the date as apparently no records were kept by London County Council. I now believe that my parents decided we had to be evacuated as the V1 and V2 rockets that were now a daily occurrence posed too much of a threat, the main target being Woolwich Arsenal close by. **(see paragraph below).*

I have clear memories of arriving at Waterloo station with a brown bag, gas mask and an I.D. label tied to my coat. The journey to our destination in South Devon, seemed to be endless, and I remember eating sandwiches on the train. When we finally arrived at the railway station in Devon we were met by a charabanc that took us to our final destination the small village of Ugborough, not far from Ivybridge.

We all went to the local church, which stood on a hill facing the village square, and waited for the local people to pick who they would look after. Unfortunately nobody picked us - probably because I was crying and getting very upset. Eventually all the other children had left and there was just my sister, Mary, my brother, Geoff, and myself left sitting in the church for what seemed like eternity. Finally an elderly couple, a Mr. And Mrs. Jack Hine took us to their very small cottage which was located just off the main village square, in Fore Street.

I believe that my sister was more latterly housed with a lady, a Mrs. Alice Heath, that lived in Donkey Lane, not far away, as 3 children were too much for these people to look after.

We attended the local school which was just a few minutes away, and one night I remember a German plane crashing into the playing fields just opposite the school. The following morning the children in the village were swarming all over it stripping silver paper from the wings and pocketing pieces of Perspex from the shattered windscreen.

The village Blacksmith, a Mr. George Trout, was a very kind man and I used to spend a lot of time watching him shoe the horses, he would often give us small bars of chocolate.

While we were at Ugborough my father came to visit us just once, by himself, and I remember him walking with me down a country lane holding my hand. That was the only memory I can recall of my father and was the last time we ever saw each other.

On 4th November 1944 we were told the awful news by the headmaster of the village school, a Mr. William Beare, that our family had all been killed on 1st November when a V" rocket made a direct hit on our house in Plumstead.

The copy of the school register (*see below*) from the Exeter Records Office records the headmasters entry.

From Headmaster's Log Book from Ugborough Village Infants school Ivybridge South Devon.

1944- 31 st October	Reopened at usual time this morning after half term holiday. 150 on books, 83 Devon, 67 evacuees, 132 present- weather very cold.
4 th November	News was received that on Nov.1 st (2.30 a.m.) the parents, eldest brother, grandmother and aunt of Mary, Michael and Geoffrey Hume (evacuees from Plumstead) were all killed by enemy action. I had the sad task of telling these children the sad news. Their relatives lived at Eglington Road, Plumstead, and their house received a direct hit from a bomb or a 'mystery' shell (V.2.)
9 th November	Peter H. Crocker, an evacuee living at Bittaford hit his nose against the playground wall and made his nose bleed. Owing to the possibility of concussion, I called in the nurse who said

My mother, father, elder, brother, aunt and grandmother were all killed in the rocket attack which took out most of the street. Not long after this my brother Geoffrey, aged 7 and myself age 5 were sent to 'Dartington Hall' in Devon as we were now classed as 'war orphans' as opposed to 'evacuees' because we no longer had a family.

Our older sister, Mary, aged 12 went to a family home at "Greystone" Hope Cove near Kingsbridge in Devon, with a view to being adopted by the family.

In May 1945, Geoffrey and I returned to Plumstead in South London to live with an elderly aunt and uncle and in August of that year our sister Mary also returned to London to live with us.

*There are no records available from London County Council recording actual dates when we were evacuated from London but it is believed that it was in July 1944 at about the time when enemy V2 rockets were increasingly being directed by the Germans to the South London area and our mum and dad decided that it was just too dangerous for us children to remain at home.

I have tried to obtain of exactly when we were evacuated from Plumstead, but so far have been unsuccessful and would be most grateful if anyone reading this has any information on when our evacuation took place. *(Is any Ugborough resident able to help?)*

Additional information from e mail conversations.

My wife and I visited Ugborough a few years ago and amazingly it hadn't changed much from as I remembered it in 1944.

However I do remember there was a small chapel to the left of the village square looking towards the church, also I seem to remember there was a small shop. We used to attend the chapel on Sunday and I was once presented with a small bible, unfortunately over the years this has been lost. We managed to obtain a really old picture of Fore Street, possibly taken in the early 1900's (*see back page*)and I think the small cottage where we stayed with a Mr. A and Mrs. Hine is pictured on the left.

(Post script- Mr. Michael Hume and his wife, Chris are celebrating their diamond wedding anniversary next year and now live in a small village in Bedfordshire. Many thanks to them for this most interesting information about Ugborough's past)





Beryl's Bookworms – *Joan Fletcher*

Our book this month was *The Salt Path* by Raynor Winn. *The Salt Path* was shortlisted for the Costa biography award in 2018.



In 2013 Raynor and Moth Winn lost their farmhouse and source of income. Around the same time Moth was diagnosed with a rare degenerative brain disease, CBD, and told that he was unlikely to survive more than six years. So, in August 2013 they set off to walk the 630-mile South West Coast Path, wild camping along the way. They experienced both literal and metaphorical ups and downs. They had to cope with extremes of weather, hunger and lack of money but all the hardships were faced with an attitude that we found inspirational.

On the walk Raynor and Moth experienced for themselves the negative attitudes people had towards the homeless and Raynor has since written an article for *The Big Issue* on homelessness.

Almost all of us really enjoyed the book and found it uplifting. For some of us we were reminded of our own walks along sections of the path, places we knew and experiences we'd had as we followed Raynor and Moth's journey. There was talk of throwing commitment to the wind and setting off into the sunset! Well, maybe not but I am inspired to finish the last part of the path through Dorset 'the cheats way', as one of us put it, staying in B&Bs.

We gave *The Salt Path* an average score of 4 out of 5. Next month's book is *Mad Blood Stirring* by Simon Mayo.

The May Parish Council Meetings started with the Annual Parish Meeting.

Following the election, the Parish Councillors completed their Declarations of Acceptance of Office. We are pleased to welcome Tim Slater as a new Councillor: Tim is a resident and parent of children who have grown up in Ugborough. He has had a varied career spanning public, voluntary and private sectors, including 20-years' experience in senior leadership roles within local government. He will bring to the Parish Council experience of planning, grant funding and management of housing, community, environmental and leisure services.

George Beable continues as Chairman, and there have been minor changes in Councillor responsibilities.

DNP Parish Member Cathie Pannell is also facing re-election. Amongst a number of National Park initiatives she outlined, Love Moor Life aims to protect lambs and nesting birds by keeping dogs on leads from the 1st March to the 31rd July.

Devon County Cllr Hosking announced the new Doing What Matters Community Grant Scheme, which '...is connecting people in a positive, fulfilling and inclusive way; tackling and reducing loneliness and undesired isolation in all their forms and across all age groups..'. A total of £300k is available for 2019/20, with a maximum grant of £20k and a minimum 25% match-funding. The webpage also provides details of the new Making the Connection Grant Funding and Crowdfund Devon.

Cllr Hosking will follow up complaints that Lutterburn Street is very dark now that the lamp post had been removed.

Planning applications considered at the Meeting (with recommendations in **bold**):

- Construction of 2 residential dwellings on an infill site, formerly Whiteoaks camp site at Whiteoaks Davids Lane Filham [1386/19/OPA](#) **Neutral. Query land contamination from the previous toilet block/septic tank**
- Installation of velux window at 5 Church Lane, Moorhaven Village Ref [0189/19](#) **Neutral**

Parish Council grants were made towards the Ugborough Village website and Bittaford community planting. Thank you to Cllr Nelson and his volunteers for making the centre of Bittaford so attractive.

The Parish Council audit was approved at the meeting, and details are available on the website and noticeboards. Receipts in 2018/19 amounted to £30,525 and payments £22,115. Compared to the previous year, changes to receipts included an increase in burial fees and reduction in grant receipts. In relation to payments: Parish lengthsman expenses have reduced as the backlog of work was completed in previous years; and non-revenue expenses declined as 2018/9 purchases were limited to benches, planting tubs and speed sign fixings.

The Parish has the right to inspect, question and object to the accounts – look out for the official notices on the noticeboards and website.

Public Footpaths have received emergency attention. Footpath 13 at Dunwell has been closed while wooden steps are repaired, and a handrail may be installed to improve safety for Footpath 24 at Whitehouse Hill. Farmers have complained about dogs mess in fields crossed by footpaths – which may contaminate crops and livestock.

Dogs mess in the Erme Playing Fields continues to be a very unpleasant problem for players, including children. As signage and an article in the press have had no effect, the only alternative is to fence in the footpath – which SHDC Cllr Holway will follow up.

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held on Wednesday 5th June, starting at 7.30 p.m. Agenda and minutes will be displayed on the noticeboards and website.
